

Walking from the Kurpark to Aukamm

easy on foot

From the Kurpark, from the viewpoint behind the pond, we are drawn along the Salzbach brook towards the Aukammtal valley. With its large proportion of wetland habitats, the landscape park makes an important contribution to the urban climate and to calm recreation close to nature. Those seeking relaxation can walk through the park, over small bridges and past large stands of reeds, old and young willows, fresh and wet meadows until the path finally leads to the Apothecary Garden.





The Apothecary Garden

Marvelling, smelling, discovering

Although the Apothecary Garden is not named after its impressive floral splendour, the focus here is clearly on the health-promoting effects of medicinal plants. Opened in 1986, the Apothecary Garden is a treasure for those thirsty for knowledge and those seeking relaxation. Over an area of 5,500 square metres, more than 250 medicinal and aromatic plants can be seen – and smelled – from mid-May to the beginning of October. The arrangement of the twenty-eight beds is based on the properties of the plants and their medicinal benefits. For example, individual beds are dedicated to liver and bile complaints, digestive complaints, and heart complaints.

Aukamm Orangery

From the Apothecary Garden, our path leads us just a few metres further to the Aukamm Orangery on the site of the former municipal plant nursery. Here, a small idyll consisting of a café and farm shop in the former palm house, its own nursery and event location presents itself – all under the roof of an open and responsible integrative facility. During the summer months, fresh organic vegetables and herbs grown on site in the eight greenhouses of the small nursery are sold daily in the farm shop. The tomato world with its seventy different varieties is also part of this. The home–grown young plants, which are offered in spring, are particularly popular.

Exploring Schierstein

The Schierstein marina is a local recreation area and water sports hotspot for the people of Wiesbaden. They proudly call it the "Schierstein Riviera" because it is a wonderful place to stroll along the waterfront promenade – past yachts, sailing boats, and pleasure boats, in the shade under the trees and surrounded by lush nature. All this is twice as nice with an ice cream in your hand from one of the two traditional ice cream stands right on the water. You can walk all the way around the dock via a pedestrian bridge – which also gives you an impressive view of the river Rhine and the harbour promenade.

Schierstein's vineyards


Tuscany in Wiesbaden

A walk through the vineyards of Schierstein and Frauenstein is worth its while. It is particularly quiet and idyllic here; when the sun is low, the view across the fields and vineyards is almost reminiscent of Tuscany. In spring, the blooming cherry and apple trees are an additional highlight.



Since 1967

the Dyckerhoff Bridge has spanned the entrance to the Schierstein marina as a pedestrian bridge made of lightweight concrete. To mark the company's centenary in 1964, the Dyckerhoff cement works and the City of Wiesbaden donated the prestressed concrete structure.

If you need a little more action and speed, Hai-Charter is the right place for you: here you can actually rent everything that's fun on the water – motorboats, SUPs, jet skis, pedal boats, and even a party raft for twelve people, including a barbecue and sun deck.

In summer several times a day, you can take the "Tamara" to the Rettbergsaue Schierstein and Biebrich Rhine islands – for the most part an idyllic nature reserve but also popular leisure areas with a camping site, island café, various ball game areas, barbecue areas, and a white sandy beach. Pure island feeling!

Raise a glass with the locals

The locals gather in Hans-Römer-Platz for a glass of wine and a long chat until late in the evening. And if you don't come from Schierstein, or *Scheerstaan* as it is known here, you'll be part of it anyway after sharing a glass of wine or two. The wines offered here come from the local wine-growing estates – primarily Riesling.



The RheinMain CongressCenter (RMCC) is a large, modern event venue in Wiesbaden with primarily three impressive event halls. Since it opened in 2018, congresses, trade fairs, concerts, and various shows – from dance to comedy – have been held here. The RMCC is particularly impressive thanks to its architecture and the sustainable overall concept: the mix of natural stone, wood, glass and metal elements clearly conveys to its guests the sustainable orientation of this multi-award-winning event venue.


Colourful manga world at the RMCC

From 6 to 8 September, the area around Wiesbaden's RMCC will once again be transformed into a colourful Japanese comic world. Connichi, Germany's largest anime and manga convention organised by fans for fans, has now found its home in the RMCC in Wiesbaden for the second year. Last year, the event attracted several thousand fans to the city. They caused quite a stir with their imaginative costumes and masks based on models from the anime and manga world.

Art for architecture

Centring on water

Emilia Neumann, a sculptor based in Frankfurt, created "Congress Sculptures" specifically for the RMCC. Almost four metres in height, the trio of sculptures has its permanent home on the lawn in front of the event hall. For her work, the artist used Wiesbaden's thermal springs and the related subject of water as a reference. The amorphous sculptures consist of reinforced concrete coloured in the casting. In her working method, Emilia Neumann operated somewhere between painting and sculpture, using everyday objects, such as water containers, rain barrels and water shells, as a starting point to create formative elements for the concrete casting. Their original use is still alluded to but then dissolves into the non-objective for the viewer. What do you recognise in the sculptures?

Reinhard Ernst Museum

In the summer of 2024, the highly anticipated Reinhard Ernst Museum will open on Wilhelmstraße: a state-of-the-art museum presenting more than 860 paintings and sculptures from the field of abstract art. Loans from museums and private individuals from all over the world as well as the collection of Reinhard Ernst, the businessman whose name the museum carries, are on show here. The exhibition focuses on post-war German and European art, Japanese art, and American Abstract Expressionism. Reinhard Ernst succeeded in recruiting Fumihiko Maki, the internationally renowned architect, to design the museum with its bright, friendly atmosphere and fully glazed, open-top atrium.

Experiencing Art Nouveau

At the Museum Wiesbaden, enthusiasm for the extensive Art Nouveau exhibition continues unabated: now in its fifth year, the museum presents an extraordinary Art Nouveau collection that brings to life the fin de siècle spirit. The F.W. Neess Collection featuring more than five hundred objects is characterised both by the exceptional quality of the works and their outstanding art historical significance. Furniture, glass, ceramics, lamps, paintings, and silver combine to form a Gesamt-kunstwerk.

There is also an exhibition of works by Max Pechstein, the Expressionist artist. The exciting question here is: why did an expressive painter, who was primarily concerned with emotions, voluntarily and not infrequently avoid the subjective element of colour? In order to work this out, all the artist's major subjects – landscape, nude, family, or religion – are presented in colour and black and white works. Since last year, the museum café has been shining in a new look and with a new offer: Trüffel Feinkost, the traditional Wiesbaden company, now runs the Trüffel Museumscafé offering a selection of large and small delicacies.

Aktives Museum Spiegelgasse

Jewish life in Wiesbaden

At the "Aktives Museum Spiegelgasse für Deutsch-Jüdische Geschichte in Wiesbaden" [Spiegelgasse Active Museum of German-Jewish History in Wiesbaden], you will find answers as to who the 1,500 Jewish Wiesbaden citizens were who were persecuted and murdered during the Nazi era, and what Jewish life in Wiesbaden was like before and after the Shoah. Spiegelgasse played an important role as a street with a long Jewish tradition. And as a museum, the main aim of the institution is to educate you on the German-Jewish history of Wiesbaden. The museum's major activities include special exhibitions as well as the long-standing projects "Erinnerungsblätter" [Sheets of Remembrance] and the "Stolpersteine" [Stumbling Stones] from the internationally renowned art project.





Stumbling Stones in Wiesbaden

App developed by pupils

The "Stolpersteine in Wiesbaden" app was initiated and designed by Campus Klarenthal pupils. Using the app on your mobile phone, you can access further information about the Stumbling Stones, brass-covered paving stones set in the pavement in front of the last freely chosen homes of victims of National Socialist terror, and find out more about the individual fates of the Jews living in Wiesbaden.





Michelsberg Memorial

Commemorative band of names

The Michelsberg Memorial is located on the former site of the synagogue of the Old Israelite Community, which was destroyed in the November pogroms of 1938. The central element of the memorial is the band of names that lists the names of 1,549 Jews from Wiesbaden murdered in the Shoah. The biographical details of those murdered were researched by the City Archives in collaboration with the Spiegelgasse Active Museum.

Hofladen Haselnuss with bistro

The small grocery shop on Yorckstraße offers a large selection of organically grown fruit and vegetables, bread and pastries as well as a well-stocked cheese, sausage, and meat counter. The small bistro is a popular meeting place in the Westend to socialise with neighbours over an organic hot drink. You can also have breakfast there or a small snack at lunchtime.

Café Hier & Jetzt with bakery

On Blücherstraße, you will find Hier & Jetzt, the cosy local Kiez café. Here you can enjoy vegetarian and vegan breakfast varieties as well as roast bread and cakes either in the café with its vintage wooden furniture or outside on the leafy terrace. The bakery is also located just a stone's throw away. In addition to the famous sourdough bread, the cinnamon buns and cardamom knots, which have long since achieved cult status in the café, are also available here.



Maldaner Coffee Roasters with workshops

With his passion for really good coffee, Sebastian Schulz has been running his coffee roastery, Maldaner Coffee Roasters, in a charming backyard on Hellmundstraße since 2018. The ethically traded beans are freshly roasted here every week. You can drop by on Fridays and Saturdays – there is also a small selection of cakes to match the speciality coffees for you to enjoy in the roastery or outside in the courtyard. The Workshop Lab is also located in the roastery: various courses teach you everything you need to know about coffee beans, or you can learn how to roast coffee or create latte art in hands-on workshops

The Bergkirchenviertel quarter Hood love

The Bergkirchenviertel quarter is a charming residential area with many small, owner-managed shops with artisan crafts and lively restaurants. A tour is worthwhile to experience the atmosphere and lifestyle of this neighbourhood: walk past the Roman gate and Kaiser-Friedrich-Therme spa and up Obere Webergasse. When you reach the historical Bergkirche church, your path continues on the opposite side of the street down narrow stairs leading to Nerostraße. And at the bottom of Nerostraße, you will get to Kranzplatz square with the Kochbrunnen thermal spring and pavilion.





You'll probably feel like you've travelled back in time to decades gone by when you enter the tiny Konditorei Gehlhaar patisserie on Klarenthaler Straße. Schloss Freudenberg

Surrounded by its magnificent park, Schloss Freudenberg castle has overlooked the vineyards of Frauenstein for more than 120 years. Since 1993, the grounds have been home to the Field of Experience for the Senses and the Mind. More than a hundred interactive stations playfully introduce you to natural phenomena such as balance, gravity, light and darkness, sound and resonance. Real highlights: you can enjoy a vegetarian breakfast in the Dunkel-Bar and a tasty menu in the Nacht-Mahl restaurant in complete darkness.

The legendary Tanzbar Freudenberg has long since been the talk of the town taking you all the way back to the Roaring Twenties, to an analogue "Babylon Berlin" when dance parties were still exuberant and ecstatic – with five hours of exceptional live music and delicious drinks. On selected Saturdays, you can have breakfast in daylight at the *Schlossbrunch* buffet in a cosy atmosphere at the Schlosscafé – vegetarian or vegan, regional and carefully selected.





Incidentally, you can get married in a civil ceremony and celebrate at Schloss Freudenberg, as it is one of Wiesbaden's special wedding venues.



After a tour through the Frauenstein vineyards, the Apfelweinstube im Himmelreich tavern is the perfect place to rest and recharge your batteries. And admire the unique view over the vineyards down to the river Rhine. In the Himmelreich – which incidentally translates to 'Heaven' –, you can taste the *Himmelreicher Apfelwein* cider directly from the producer. There are also down-to-earth Hessian specialities such as *Handkäse* sour milk cheese und *Spundekäse* cream cheese as well as schnitzel with potato salad. Even if it's often packed: the guests don't mind squeezing together on the benches. Or you can find a spot on the meadow.

A 2.5

kilometre

walk takes you from Schloss Freudenberg through the vineyards to the Goethestein in Frauenstein where you can enjoy a gorgeous view.

From Schloss Freudenberg, you can take a leisurely stroll through the Frauenstein vineyards. If you are a more ambitious hiker, you can walk through the vineyards to the Goethestein triangular pyramid, or even as far as the Schierstein marina. If you just wish to stretch your legs after a sumptuous breakfast in the castle, taking a shorter route and enjoying the view is also a good idea.



Exploring the Rheingau region

Look forward to one of the most important wine regions in Germany. In less than fifteen minutes, the Rheingau line will take you to the idyllic wine towns on the Rhine, surrounded by a cultural landscape offering numerous award-winning hiking trails, a variety of renowned wine estates, romantic castles, famous palaces, historic monastery walls, and verdant vineyards. The home of the Riesling celebrates its wines and wineries throughout the year – be it at one of the more than twenty-five wine tasting stands available in almost every town in the Rheingau, in the many renowned and prize-winning wine estates and cosy wine taverns, on wine hikes in the picturesque vineyards, and at the wine festivals held in the charming little towns on the Rhine.

Imagine a passionate group of wine lovers – first and foremost Emmanuel 'Manu' Straub, who already runs the "Plattenstübchen" in Geisenheim – who have been travelling the wine world for many years. And an exciting shop concept: the Chin Chin is more than just a wine shop, it sees itself as a platform that brings together the next generation of winegrowers, retailers, and customers. Tastings and events with selected winegrowers give visitors the chance to experience the wines and the people behind them. But the Chin Chin is not only at home in Geisenheim. You should definitely be keeping your eyes open: you might discover a Chin Chin pop-up wine bar in Wiesbaden and Mainz as well.

Wine taverns and inns open their cellars and courtyards from 26 April to 5 May. Have a chat with the winegrowers, taste the new vintage, enjoy freshly prepared dishes, explore the vineyards, and let yourself be carried away by the live music offered in selected courtyards during the Rheingauer Schlemmerwochen, or Rheingau gourmet weeks.



By the way, the Hochheim Wine Festival is considered one of the most beautiful in our region. Held in Hochheim's old town and vineyards from 12 to 15 July – come by!

in Hochheim

As a VDP predicate wine estate with a long family tradition, the Weingut Künstler estate in Hochheim is a real gem on the river Main. Wines of the highest calibre have been produced here since 1965: today, over seventy percent of the vineyards are VDP-classified as "Große Lage", referring to a premium site. Thanks to the annual national and international awards, the wine-growing estate is now one of the most renowned wineries in Germany. So, you should definitely enjoy a tasting at the bar in the estate's idyllic courtyard.

Top wines meet top cuisine: two years ago, the two sisters Nathalie and Jennifer Dienstbach from Wiesbaden opened their restaurant, Les deux Dienstbach, offering fine French cuisine at the wine estate in a joint project with the Künstler family – a revival of the restaurant success that Nathalie and Jennifer enjoyed on Untere Albrechtstraße in Wiesbaden. And with great rewards: they have just won a Gault & Millau award in the 2023/24 "Best Restaurants" category. It goes without saying that the two talented and bright twin sister chefs have already appeared in front of the camera in various TV cookery shows.

Weingut Mohr

The Weingut Mohr wine estate in Lorch combines two culinary passions: winegrower Jochen Neher is the fourth generation to be responsible for the exciting, organic wines, while his wife Saynur is the one in charge of the lively, oriental cuisine. Born in Turkey, she offers her Turkish cookery courses at the winery, courses that are now well-known throughout Germany. Her speciality: meze – a variety of small Turkish dishes, but with a lot of oriental flavour. However, there is much more going on at the wine estate: the wine tavern is open during the Rheingauer Schlemmerwochen, or Rheingau gourmet weeks. And on 20 April and 13 July, there will be culinary wine hikes through Lorch's picturesque vineyards. In the summer months, Jochen and Saynur will also present their wines at various wine festivals in the region.

Weingut Dillmann in Geisenheim

Rosalinde, Milde Hilde, Rainer Stoff, Jana Türlich - well, would you have guessed that these names stand for wines produced with passion and authenticity? The Weingut Dillmann wine estate in Geisenheim may be slightly different, because real "Riesling ravers" are at work here: as a young family business run by the two brothers Marcel und Marius, who are firmly rooted in the Rheingau and are local celebrities thanks to their commitment, the wine estate creates honest wines all of which are fun to drink. The Dillmann boys have created a gem up in the Geisenheim vineyards with their wine estate building, vinotheque and wine tavern, and regularly host events there that have become famous beyond the local borders. Indeed, even beyond the borders of the Rheingau region.

throughout the Rheingau give you the chance to get to know local winegrowers and their wines.

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"Hallgarten Sun Round" Riesling Loop

feat. Riesling Pier

The "Hallgarten Sun Round" Riesling Loop takes you through the picturesque Hallgarten vineyards past various sights, such as the Revoluzzer Gartenhäuschen garden house – run by the local Weingut Bibo Runge wine estate, the Jewish cemetery, or the "Schröter Madonna". Afterwards, you can reward yourself at the Riesling Pier, the Gutsausschank wine bar of the Weingut Keßler wine estate. Here you can savour the wines and a selection of dishes, ranging from delicious schnitzel variations to sophisticated vegetarian meals and served on the large terrace in Oestrich-Winkel's vineyards with a view across the Rhine valley.

From April, you can go on various wine hikes in the Rheingau. Local winegrowers offer their wines at the wine tasting stands along the hiking trail, and, of course, there are also culinary delights.

Your path leads you through the Martinsthal vineyards with their famous "Martinsthaler Wildsau" wine site and the shady forest with its chestnut avenue. Once you have climbed the almost 180 metres in altitude, you descend to the vineyard house of the Weingut Diefenhardt wine estate surrounded by vines: in the summer months, you can relax here with an impressive panoramic view of the surrounding vineyards and the river Rhine while enjoying wine and small treats – and even live music at weekends.
